Here the poet depicts the treatment of inequality with women by the men-dominated society.

B. In 'Going Places' the character, Sophie is a young girl who belongs to a poor family. But is very ambitious. She has no money, yet she thinks of buying a nice boutique after her school. She also plans to become an actress or a fashion designer. All such dreams are in Sophie's mind only. There is no chance of their ever becoming a reality. So is the story of her disappointment in Danny Casey. She takes a chance meeting with him as the culmination of their romance. She keeps waiting for him even when she knows that there is no possibility of his coming.

As far as the character of 'Poets and Pancake', Subbu is concerned, he was the No. 2 at Gemini Studios. He could never do things of his own, but had the ability to look cheerful at all times. During the golden years of the Gemini Studios, Subbu had his hand in every important affair of the company. He had a separate identity as





a poet. He composed several truly original'story poems' in folk diction. He was an amazing actor. He never aspired to the lead roles. But whatever role he played, he performed better than the main players. He was tailor-made for films.

Then he created a conflict between patriotism and kindness to humanity. One night, Dr. Sadao found a badly wounded man. Though the man was an enemy soldier, as a doctor, Sadao took the man into his house and did all he could to save his life. In this way, Dr. Sadao rose above narrow prejudices and acted in a truly humanitarian manner. The writer also showed his narrative techniques very cleverly by depicting how Dr. Sadao diplomatically maintained his patriotic spirits as well.
 - **B.** The author has knitted the story '*The Third Level*' in a very creative way. He has depicted the themes of escapism and nostalgia in a very effective narrative techniques. It is impossible for two different periods of history to exist simultaneously. In this story, we find the nineteenth century and the modern century existing side by side. The Grand Central Station has two levels where modern new-style currency is used. There is also a third level where the old-style currency of eighteen-ninety-something is used. We can say that the author has tried to weave fantasy with reality. The third level is merely a fantasy that exists in Charley's mind only. It is his escapist fantasy. His psychiatrist friend, Sam, is right when he calls it 'a waking-dream wish fulfilment'. Charley's visit to the third level is all a fantasy. He takes it for a reality and plans a journey to Galesburg. He even exchanges his new bills of three hundred dollars for old-style bills. But he is never again able to find the third level. It is because the third level existed in his fantasy only. So we can say that the third level was a medium of escape for Charley. It was only his escapist fantasy that the author has depicted in a very effective narrative technique.

Keats has given such lively description of beauty in this poem that it stimulates the reader's inner sight as well as sense of touch and smell.

A FIRE ACCIDENT / A MASSIVE FIRE IN SADAR BAZAR

A Report

May 26: A massive fire in Sadar Bazar, Delhi claimed 15 lives and huge loss of property. The fire tragedy occured in a big garment showroom. The fire which occured due to a short circuit, started at 4.00. p.m. The fire was first noticed by a worker at the showroom. He immediately reported the matter to the owner of the showroom who was minding the cash counter. In no time, the fire engulfed the entire showroom. The persons on the ground floor saved their lives by rushing out of the showroom. But the workers working at the upper floor got stuck in the fire. Therefore, the fire spread like a wild fire. A loss to the tune of ` 2000 crore has been estimated.

They engaged lawyers to go to the court. It was at this point that Gandhiji appeared in Champaran. He fought for the poor peasants a long battle for one year. At last, he got justice for them. Now the peasants gained courage and they knew their rights also. Along with this political and economic fight, Gandhiji worked on the social level also. He arranged for the education, health and hygiene of the poor peasant families. He taught them the lesson of self-reliance. It was, in a way, a step forward in the struggle for Indian independence.

- (b) In this poem, the poet brings out the common story of almost all married women through the story of Aunt Jennifer. All married women spend all their life in doing household chores from morning till evening, produce children and bring them up with loving care, put up with all the bullying of their husbands and then at last pass into their graves with no regard from anyone. Aunt Jennifer is a typical housewife. She embroiders some tigers in wool on a screen. The tigers are lovely to look at. They seem to be prancing across the screen. Some men are standing under a tree. Uncle has dominated her so cruelly all her life that now she thinks those ordeals to be part of her life. The poet imagines that even when Aunt Jennifer dies, there will be no peace for her. Even in her grave she will be thinking of her daily chores. The tigers on her panel will go on prancing as usual, but the poor Aunt Jennifer will be lying lifeless in her grave. This poem also depicts the picture of male chauivinism. Women give birth to men but those very men dominate and tyrannize over them all their life.
